Dear Friends

War and Peace

John Lennon wrote: 'Imagine there's no countries, It isn't hard to do, Nothing to kill or die for, And no religion too. Imagine all the people living life in peace.' But on Remembrance Sunday, we should reflect on war past and present, and consider the real way to peace.

The way of war: 'What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? You desire but do not have, so you kill.' (James 4:1-2). James reminds us that war has its basis in our own hearts, with the selfish desires that exploit, bully and kill others to get our own way. Sadly, when nations allow these inner selfish attitudes to determine their policy the result is war. Only God can establish true peace.

The way of peace: Isaiah, 2,700 years before John Lennon, also imagined a future of peace without any war: 'They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.' (Isaiah 2:4).

Only Jesus, the Prince of Peace, can bring true peace to our lives and world. Jesus did not experience the horror of battle, but He did die an horrific death at the hand of the Romans. He gave His life sacrificially, as He took God's anger at our sin on Himself and went on to conquer death in His resurrection. He did this out of love for us, and calls us to love others in the same way: 'Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends.' (John 15:13).

How can we demonstrate such love ourselves? We can be confident in God's plan to bring an end to all wars when Jesus returns.

Monday 14th October Speaker: Members own

Our chairperson Babs Roberts welcomed us to the meeting and gave a talk and played CD's on the music of Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky. He was a Russian composer in the 19th century and was the first Russian composer to make a mark internationally. Born in 1840 he was not educated musically but for the civil service. He eventually entered the Saint Petersburg Conservatory and graduated in 1865. He wrote some of the most popular concert and theatrical music including the ballets 'Swan Lake' and 'The Nutcracker', 'the 1812 Overture', concertos, symphonies and opera.

Despite his successes his life was blighted by personal problems and depression, including being separated from his mother to go to boarding school and her early death, the death of a close friend and his failed marriage. He died suddenly of cholera at 53 years old.

Music played included the following:

'Sugar Plum Fairy' from the Nutcracker Suite. This gave happy memories for Angela as she can remember dancing to this with her colleagues working at the telephone exchange at the GPO.

'5th Symphony in E minor' played by the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra asked for by Gillian.

The 4th Movement of the 5th Symphony. Everyone enjoyed this music.

Nutcracker Suite -

'Arabian Dance'. This was very dramatic with tambourines.

'Chinese Dance'.

'Dance of the Reed Flutes'. Many will recognize this from a chocolate advert.

'Waltz of the Flowers'. Another well known tune.

Swan Lake

The 2nd movement of the 6th Symphony (Pathetique). This was very dramatic.

1812 Overture. This started quietly then became more lively.

Barbara thanked everyone for listening and we all enjoyed the music.

An interesting and informative talk by Clive and his playing of the piano enjoyed by all. Angela gave the vote of thanks.

Church in Wales to invest nearly £10m in new schemes to promote growth

The Church in Wales has announced investment totalling nearly £10m in four major projects designed to promote growth in church attendance across the nation.

Projects in north east Wales, in Swansea and in Monmouth will be given multimillion-pound grants to develop new initiatives, centres and church communities.

The grants are being made from the Church Growth Fund, in which the Church is investing £100m to support projects in a once-in-a generation opportunity to resource confident and consistent evangelism throughout Wales.

The Church Growth Fund is a development of the Church in Wales's recent Evangelism Fund programme, which has been successful in helping create fast-growing congregations in several parts of Wales.

One of the four new projects is for six new 'Mission Hub Churches' in the diocese of St Asaph, which has already successfully established four such Hub projects since 2021 in Welshpool, Mold, Penrhyn Bay and Holywell.

The second project, also in St Asaph diocese, is a scheme to create a team of Pioneer Missioners in rural areas to support mission in church congregations.

For the third project, totalling £2.8m over five years, St Mary's Church in Swansea city centre will become the first minster church in Wales next year.

For the fourth project, the Diocese of Monmouth has secured funding of more than £1m to help grow new worshipping communities by building stronger relationships with schools. The project will provide a Schools Engagement Pioneer (SEP) for four carefully selected locations - North Monmouthshire, East Cardiff, Islwyn, and Abergavenny.

The Archbishop of Wales, the Most Revd Andrew John, said: "The Church Growth Fund represents a transformative step forward in our mission to reach communities across Wales with the love and hope of the Gospel."



Mothers' Union

Our first meeting in October was a very relaxing and thought provoking experience. Nabeel Masih, our vicar's husband, spoke to us about his faith, music and worship. Nabeel is a senior lecturer at Trinity St David University in Computer Animation and visual effects. Nabeel leads worship in English, Urdu, Punjabi and Hindi. His vibrant spiritual music transcends cultural barriers, infusing hope and unity. Nabeel and family lived in Abu Dhabi due to his father's work and later the family returned to Pakistan. Eventually due to the



political situation they moved to the UK. Nabeel performed in several bands delivering the Christian message in a very sincere style. Nabeel put great emphasis on how we should treat others in a caring helpful and compassionate way. He sat with members for refreshments and answered many of their questions in a lovely friendly manner.



Our second meeting in October was attended by Rev Tim Williams, Mothers' Union Chaplain, his wife, Helen who is the MU Diocesan Secretary and our Diocesan President, Ruth Roberts who is due to retire after six years. Our new president in January 2025 will be Gillian Knight, wife of the former vicar of Sketty, Canon Andrew Knight. Rev Tim spoke to us about his role of chaplain at the Royal Welsh Show (RWS) and the team of people that he works with. The showground at Llanelwedd, Builth Wells, Powys is a very busy working area and the team of chaplains are available for any event at the Royal Welsh Showground

to listen, help and advise people of all faiths or none. There are very many trade stands, competitions, international visitors, sponsors, indoor and outdoor events. The Royal Welsh Agricultural Society has played a large role in the development of agriculture and rural economy in Wales for over a century since 1904. The RWS is considered to be the largest agricultural show in Europe. Almost a quarter of a million people visit the RWS annually. Both Rev Tim and his wife Helen are dedicated chaplains at the RWS and they, with the other members of the team, work all the year round providing pastoral care for staff, visitors and exhibitors.

Ruth, our retiring president thanked members for their support over the last six years and gave each member a bookmark with our founder, Mary Sumner's prayer on the reverse of a beautiful photo of a stained-glass window. She left us with a pack of up to date MU information for Rev Layfetta.



Church Review News from the Ministry Area Council from Peter Lewis

At our September MAC meeting we agreed to undertake a review of our church life and mission as The Gower Ministry Area, a prayerful exercise in listening to the Lord, sharing our thoughts together and making plans. The process will involve the Archdeacon of Gower (Ven Jonathan Davies), our laity in our congregations and our clergy in the ministry area.

Using Psalm 23 as our backdrop, it is a process by which we can feel confident that the Anglican churches in our ministry area are best equipped for us to proclaim that the Lord Jesus is our Shepherd: an invitation that we offer to the unchurched and an expression for deepening the discipleship of church members.

This review gives scope to express dynamic and bold steps forward, a faithfulness of living out our faith, ideas for growth as well as the challenges of declining congregations, scarcity of people with the energy/time/skills and insufficient finances.

This variety of feelings and circumstances are all contained within Psalm 23 and we need to be realistic in recognising that the Lord is with us in the valley of the shadow of death as much as by quiet waters and green pastures.

The review itself is a series of questions to be discussed around the topics of Vision, Plans, Purpose; Pastoral and Caring; Growing Faith; Buildings; Giving and Finance; Worship.

The plan is:

Oct-Dec 2024, MA Chapter (clergy, MA wardens, MA treasurer, MA chair) review each congregation, noting the insights from the priests with particular oversight in the relevant cluster of churches.

Jan - Mar 2025, each congregational committee uses the questions to review their church together.

May 2025, MA Chapter & Archdeacon consider first and second reviews and make recommendations

June 2025, MAC and congregations respond to recommendations Sept 2025, MAC work to agree on a plan, following any constitutional procedures, appropriate steps are initiated in a timely manner.

Sermon Series

All our congregations will be following the same themes from 17th Nov through to mid Advent. We start with safeguarding Sunday and then move through four weeks considering topics of 'growing as disciples'.

In Search of Christmas

Last year in Reynoldston, lots of people from all over the ministry area took part in a family trail around the village. This year we have an event which will bring people to follow clues around the village whilst visiting three venues: the village hall for puppets singing and dancing; St George's Church for creative prayer and then the Methodist chapel for Christmas craft. The event will help all ages engage with the Nativity and will run from 11am to 4pm.

If you'd like to have space outside for prayerfulness, then come to Wild Church walk on Saturday 23rd Nov 1pm Oxwich exploring 'Seeking Solitude' as we venture along the beach to Nicholaston woods. Our Growth Fund Bid for the wellbeing project for 5 years will be assessed by the panel at the end of November, and if successful then Chloe will be continuing as the creative practioner and will be joined by a wellbeing chaplain and a project coordinator.

St James the Least of All

On why the Church should never combine parishes

My dear Nephew Darren

I suppose it had to come, but combining parishes is now firmly on the agenda for our villages. I had always wondered what the first Earl of Stowe was trying to prove, building a church here in 1347 to accommodate 800 people when the total population has never exceeded 250. In the short term – which in this village is measured in centuries - it seems to have been to house the tombs of his 13 successors. I now realise it was to make uniting with adjoining parishes in the 21st century more difficult. Clearly the first Earl had formidable foresight. None of our neighbouring churches seem too keen to share their reserves to help maintain our cathedral-sized building.

The threat of the closure of St Herve the Bard has, inevitably, caused outrage – not so much from its regular congregation of three, but from all those in the village who would never think of attending. People do so like to have a church not to go to.

The church of St Bregowine, built by a wealthy parishioner in the 19th century because she did not like the high church practices of the parish church of St Iwig, is refusing to re-unite, even though the two churches stand only 100 yards apart, in a village with a diameter of 300 yards. If only they could get over the trauma of seeing the incumbent putting water in the wine on Easter Day in 1894.

(Although it must be conceded that the Bregowinians were equally affronted that when the daughter church opened in 1895, they found that the lwigers had provided no brass troughs at the end of the pews for umbrellas. That they have subsequently refused to install them has only compounded the offence.)

Meanwhile St Plegmund is in discussions with the Church of South India as a way of avoiding uniting with anyone. Should it happen, I will be interested to see what travelling expenses the new incumbent claims. It will be difficult to tell when the present incumbent resigns, as he has not been seen at a clerical meeting for the last 30 years. Some of my colleagues suspect he is mythical, that a bloodless coup took place in the 1980s and that the church is now entirely run by the Mothers' Union.

The church of St Maximus of Constantinople in our nearest town has rather grandly offered to take all of our churches under its wing, but as a parishioner has pointed out: how could we possibly consider joining with a parish that fought on the other side at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485.

In the meantime, we will serenely carry on, as we seem to have done for the past six centuries; parish mergers and reductions in numbers of clergy seem to be of less interest than debating the suggestion that we change the brand of coffee served after Services.


