

Dear Friends

The story is told of a farmer who didn't believe in Jesus. One snowy Christmas Eve, his wife was taking their children to a service at their local church. He refused to come saying: 'Why would God lower Himself to come to Earth as a man? That's ridiculous!' So, they left him at home.

Law Commission consultation

The Law Commission is consulting on some suggestions for changes to Burial and Cremation law in England and Wales. Following this consultation, the Law Commission will finalise proposals for consideration by Government. Whilst their proposals are some way from becoming law, this is an important first step. Government would then consider the recommendations and consider when to bring forward legislation. Much of the law in this area is devolved to Welsh Government.

The consultation document is extensive and covers a variety of issues. Whilst the Representative Body will be responding for the whole Province on the whole document, we would encourage MA's and Dioceses to contribute to the consultation too. In particular, we would draw your attention to Chapter 7 and question 31. This proposes a radical change that would impact significantly on the Church in Wales. By way of background, the Welsh Church (Burial Grounds) Act 1945 imposes obligations on the Church in Wales to bury parishioners without discrimination - a similar duty to the Church of England. No other denomination in Wales has this obligation of public burial. However, the Church in Wales does not have the equivalent power (Under the Local Government Act 1972) to transfer maintenance of closed burial grounds to

local authorities.

a similar power is granted to the Church in Wales. We believe this power would be very useful for MA's caring for closed churchyards and it does seem fair that MA's should be relieved of the burden of maintenance once a burial ground has no more space for burials. We believe this burden should fall on the wider community through the Local Authority. We have no doubt that Local Authorities will object strongly to this proposal, so we would invite you to make a comment in support of the proposal, if possible. The more comments in favour, the more likely it is that the proposal will be retained in any recommendation to Government. If you wish to respond in support of this proposal, we would recommend that you explain in your response how this change will impact on your MA and community.

Make Your Money Go Further



The Gift Aid scheme is an arrangement that allows charities (including churches) to reclaim tax on a donation made by a UK taxpayer. This means every donation will be worth 25% more, at no extra cost to the giver so, with Gift Aid, the charity can claim an extra 25p for every £1 donated.

For example: If you give £5, the church receives £6.25; if you give £10.00 the church receives £12.50 etc

You can see how this mounts up and is a valuable source of income to the church. If you are a taxpayer, please ensure you have completed a consent form so the church can claim this extra money from the Government.

Consent forms can be obtained from Geraldine Rees, the Gift Aid Officer for St. Hilary's and St Martin's.

I will shortly be allocating the new envelopes for 2025. Those already in the scheme will receive them in due course. If your circumstances have changed, like maybe your address or your tax status (for claiming Gift Aid) please let me know as soon as possible.

Anyone not in the scheme and wishes to be, please contact me and I will arrange for you to receive your envelopes for next year.

You can also make donations direct to the church by monthly Standing Order or using the Direct Giving scheme that means your donations are made directly to the Church in Wales in Cardiff via Direct Debit from your account. Donations made this way are directed back to our church after Gift Aid has been added. Please see me for information about either of these options.

Our first meeting in November was 'Remembrance' by Andrew Jones. Andy is an amazing speaker with such a wealth of knowledge about the first and second world wars. He is an events and fund-raising consultant and has organised many visits to the war graves. He told a story for each picture he displayed. The story of Pegasus bridge was most interesting to me as Alan and I have visited the café there. Additionally, his experiences at Menin Gate fascinated us. We listened to the stories and history of Armistice Glade, Ypres, Mametz Wood, Juno Beach, Omaha Beach, Ranville and the Merville Battery. We were so grateful that Andrew gave up an afternoon to spend time with us. Thank you, Andy.

The second meeting in November was a presentation by Debra John, a local actress, who was brought up in Killay. Debra performed a story called 'Gower Dreaming'. Many of us were already aware of the stories of 18th century Gower when smugglers and pirates frequented the rugged cliffs and hidden coves of Gower. They often hid in caves and secret inlets to evade the excise men who were based in Swansea. Many of us knew already about how famous Pwll Du, Llangennith and Worms Head was for the deliberate wrecking of ships and how the pirates quickly passed on the treasures. Some of Gower's soil was poor so farming yielded little and the extra

money from contraband goods was a lifeline for many. Debra talked about the vicar of Llanmadoc who in his dream takes a journey at night around Gower. He 'travelled' to Giant's Cave, Parc Le Breos, Pennard Castle, Oxwich, Port Eynon, Rhossili and Llangennith. We heard about a violent storm, smugglers, ships wrecks, pirates evading the excise men from Swansea. We even heard about the sailors who were deliberately shipwrecked, how they drowned and then were robbed as they lay on the beaches. Thank you, Debra for a fantastic presentation.

The last meeting of the year will be on Tuesday 3 December at 2pm in St. Hilary's Hall. A bring and share buffet is planned with a raffle in aid of Mothers' Union charities.

I was so sorry that I needed to announce that Alan and I have now finished organising Mothers' Union at the end of its hundredth year at St. Hilary's. During my sixteen years as Branch Leader, Alan has helped me enormously, especially in his role as Treasurer and Secretary.

Canon David Winter reflects on the coming of Jesus...

The most beautiful story

A well-known atheist was being interviewed on Radio 4. When asked how he spent Christmas, he said that he went to Midnight Mass at church. "But you're an atheist", his interviewer protested. "Yes", he replied, "but what they celebrate at Christmas is the most beautiful story ever told."

That 'beautiful story' tells of a Creator who sent His Son to share the life of His creation, to be born as a helpless baby, to grow up as a man of extraordinary wisdom, gentleness and love, who was executed by the authorities for contradicting the traditions of the time. His followers – who today number about two billion people all over the world – believe that He rose from the dead, and that by His death and resurrection He has made possible forgiveness and eternal life for men and women everywhere.

That is certainly quite a story, perhaps the greatest story ever told, and yes, beautiful. And that is the story that will be rehearsed again this Christmas, in children's Nativities, in hymns and carols, in Bible readings and sermons all over the country. People who stay away from church all year turn up to hear it, and who can blame them? This is a story of hope, of love and of heaven touching earth.

Probably the best-known statue in the world is 'Christ the Redeemer', towering over the South American city of Rio de Janeiro, His arms outstretched in blessing. Christmas celebrates the birth of that great Redeemer – a tiny baby laid in a feeding trough.

His birth changed history, His life transformed our understanding of what it means to be human, His death was at one and the same time a tragedy and a triumph. Yes, it is 'the most beautiful story ever told'. Enjoy it again this Christmas.



Visiting the Churches in our **Ministry Area**

As I'm sure many of you know, in my role as MA Warden, I have spent the last seven Sundays visiting as many of the Gower churches as I could, service times permitting. I am extremely grateful to Rev. Peter Lewis, our MA Leader and Layfetta for making it possible for me to do this and of course to Mike Powell who has stepped up to cover many of the tasks I usually do on a Sunday with Sylvia's help. It has not been possible for me to visit any other church on the fifth Sunday of the month this year for various reasons. The fifth Sunday of March was Easter Day, so no cluster services as such, the fifth Sunday of June was the MA Annual Vestry Meeting at St. Hilary's and on the fifth Sunday of September, Layfetta was at a LyCiG training event and asked me to be at St. Hilary's. I am really looking forward to resuming these visits on December 29th, hopefully there will be a service in one of the five churches which I have yet to visit. It has been a wonderful experience for me and I have really enjoyed being part of the congregation everywhere I went, including reading in some of the churches and sharing all sorts of delicious refreshments. The welcome I have received was wonderful and I was really surprised when I realised how many of the people I met, already knew who I was.

Just to tell you where I've been, St.

Gwynour's in Penclawdd, St. David's in Llanddewi, St. Illtyd's in Oxwich, St. Madoc's in Llanmadoc, Sts Rhidian and Illtyd in Llanrhidian, St. Illtyd's in Ilston, St. Cadoc's in Cheriton, St. John the Baptist in Penmaen even managing to fit in St. Hilary's on Remembrance Sunday between two other services that day. I have also attended the Welsh language Eucharists at St. Mary's, Pennard and St. George's, Reynoldston, but these are on a Friday morning. Although we all follow the same Church-in-Wales Liturgy, it is amazing how different the services were, of course I knew the words, but every member of the Gower clergy put his or her own stamp on the service.

I know many of the Gower lanes very well now, and really appreciate how lucky we are to live in such a beautiful part of the country. I must admit that I feel as if I've met most of the sheep, cows and horses in Gower as I've driven across the commons and Cefn Bryn on Sunday mornings. I was held up by tractors towing trailers full of Christmas trees last week and by a large swan on the way to Oxwich, he was there first and was enjoying an early morning stroll in the middle of the road across the marsh, with absolutely no intention of moving for any of the cars to pass him.

Many of the people I have met have asked me to express their good wishes to the congregation at St. Hilary's, which I promised I would do.



On why Carol Services are so dangerous

My dear Nephew Darren

So, you are excited about being invited to plan your first Carol Service. The dangers involved are only slightly less than being invited to judge the best cake made by the Ladies' Group. You seem to have no idea of the lifelong offence you will inevitably cause. In decades to come when you will either be a seasoned old clergyman – or more likely a double glazing salesman – you will be remembered as "the Curate who offended Mrs Smith."

First, you have to decide which groups are going to be represented to give the readings. If the Brownies were asked last year, then it has to be the Cubs this time. But don't forget that every third year, the Boys' Brigade must be asked, or they will take their revenge and get their flag tangled in the nave chandelier come Remembrance Sunday. If someone represents the choir, then over a four year period, all four voice parts must be called on – and if the organist isn't asked on the fifth year, then all hymns subsequently will be played at double speed and with one verse missing. Should one person have been invited to read for two successive years, then their annual appearance thereafter will be taken as an inalienable right for the rest of their lifetime – and probably longer than that. To drop them may well invoke legal proceedings,

Then there is the batting order to be considered. Someone from the church council will take it as a deliberate slight if they are placed lower in the order than a representative of the Men's Fellowship and no self-respecting bell ringer would voluntarily follow a brass cleaner.

If you do not specify where they should read from and how the readings should end, then a form of ecclesiastical inflation will happen. If the first reader speaks from the chancel step, the next one will go to the lectern; after the sanctuary and pulpit have been utilised, the final reader will probably ask you to move so he can take your place. The variations on "Here endeth", "This is the Word of the Lord", and "Thanks be to God", are endless and will increase in length as the Service progresses. The final reader will probably end with a lengthy exegesis on what he thinks the passage means, correcting whatever you said in your sermon.

I once made the mistake of not telling all readers which Bible translation to use. One, an Old Testament expert, therefore decided to read in Hebrew. Not to be outdone, another read her Gospel passage in Greek – apologising beforehand that it may not be a perfect rendering, as she was spontaneously translating it from the English. And some say Christians are not competitive. You have two alternatives: either repeat last year's Service without any alteration, saying that it could not be improved, or design your own – and then take Christmas off.


